New ELCA Curriculum on Civic Life and Faith

How are we called to civic engagement, including in the arenas of government and political life? What is the proper relationship of the church with government? What does religious liberty actually include? Your congregation can explore these questions and more by using *A Study Curriculum on Civic Life and Faith*. Just released by the ELCA Task Force for Studies on Civic Life and Faith, the curriculum includes six sessions and is a critical step on the way to the social statement called for by the 2019 Churchwide Assembly.



Each session includes prayers, hymn suggestions, scriptures, a teaching video, group discussion questions, suggested resources and case studies taken from everyday life. Session topics include:

- How Is God's Invitation to Discipleship Lived Out in a Democracy?
- How Do Christians Address Controversial Civic Issues?
- What Are Lutheran Views on Civic Life?
- What Are the Objectives of Democracy in the United States?
- What's Faith-Based Living Got to Do With Civic Life?
- How Do We Go in Peace to Love and Serve the Lord in Civic Life?

There is also a response form after each session for participants to communicate with the task force on the material covered. This feedback is key in helping the task force as it moves to the next phase of drafting a social statement. ENGAGE: Save our Veterans

Wednesday, Feb. 22 - 11 a.m.-12:30 p.m. | Online

Each year more than 6,000 veterans die by suicide in the United States at a rate 1.5 times that of the general public. The lethal means most commonly used is a firearm. There is no single cause of suicide and it is often the result of a complex interaction of risk and protective factors at the individual, interpersonal, community and societal levels.



ENGAGE, the synod's gun violence prevention work group, is committed to addressing and lessening suicide by firearm for veterans. Andrea Perry of the Minneapolis VA Suicide Prevention Team will lead a conversation on S.A.V.E. (Signs, Ask, Validate and Encourage/Expedite) and share some general knowledge and data about suicide in the U.S. and specifically in the veteran population. This conversation will give you tools to identify someone who is thinking of suicide and show you what you can do to keep them safe and get immediate help. Learn more and register.

Form A and C Reports

Each congregation in the ELCA is required to turn in the Form A and C report to the churchwide organization. These forms provide essential information, including data on numbers of congregants, languages spoken in worship and more. Here's what to do, in case you missed the instructions from ELCA: Go to the **ELCA landing page** and select "Form A and C Paraochial Reports" on the right hand side. Click "update now." Enter your Congregation ID and Password and fill out both Form A and C. (Once logged in, you will find instructions of how to fill out the form and a financial worksheet.) Congregations unsure of their ID or password will be able to request them through the landing page or you may reach out to Rachel Holsten at the synod office at 651-224-4313 or rachel.holsten@spas-elca.org. Congregations are asked to submit completed forms by March 1.

Commission for a Renewed Lutheran Church



In August 2022, the ELCA Churchwide Assembly passed a memorial to create a Commission for a Renewed Lutheran Church

(CRLC) with the mandate to explore the current governance structures of the ELCA. In November, the ELCA Church Council authorized the establishment of the CRLC to consist of no more than 35 voting members and directed the Executive Committee of the Church Council to initiate the process of forming the commission.

This process calls for each synod to nominate two people to be considered for appointment. Earlier this month the Saint Paul Area Synod Council nominated Pastor Chris Bellefeuille and Pastor Patrick Shebeck. They will be considered alongside the nominees from the other eight synods in Region 3 (Minnesota, North Dakota and South Dakota) for appointment to the commission.

In addition, a third individual from each region and up to eight at-large members will be appointed from among the synod nominations and the open nomination process. The open nominations process is now active, allowing any individual to be self-nominated or beckoned into nomination by others. Trauma and Its Healing

Although we might think only of major crises when we hear the word "trauma," the term includes any disturbing experience that elicits a highly negative emotional response. Trauma is characterized in three ways: acute, chronic and complex. This presentation will offer information as to the types of trauma (and examples thereof); how they present/how they can be recognized; what damage they can do to those experiencing them; strategies for beginning the healing process; and vicarious trauma (the trauma suffered by those witnessing trauma suffered by others,
