2023 Synod Assembly Wrap-Up

Thank you to all who participated in our 2023 Synod Assembly, held May 12-13 at St. Andrew's Lutheran Church in Mahtomedi. Here are a few of the highlights:

- Under the assembly theme of "Living in Hope," featured speaker the Rev. Dr. Barbara Rossing shared a fast-moving presentation called "Seven Things That Give Me Hope for the Climate Crisis." View her **slides** OR view the **recorded presentation** (also includes the slides)
- The Rev. Louise Johnson from the ELCA shared an overview of the activities of the churchwide organization. View Rev. Johnson's slides OR watch Presiding Bishop Eaton's video
- Representatives were elected to the Synod Council and committees.
- The 2024 budget was approved.
- The assembly approved amendments to the synod constitution, along with resolutions

related to a position for a person of color on Synod Council and support for sacred tiny house communities.

What, then, is our role as creatures in the face of climate crisis? It is not to sit back and do nothing, shrugging with indifference, because we think Christ will do it all. Neither is our role one of being overwhelmed because the challenges are so grave. Our role is to get in line and follow Christ's own journey of reconciliation and solidarity with the whole creation; naming, protecting, teaching, changing our own habits of consumption, and foreswearing the assumption that the earth exists for us to use up.

Addressing Hunger: A Garden for Generations to Come

The Rice Street Gardens are now seven years old. The founders, the garden team, and most of all, the gardeners are hoping the garden continues for generations to come. This community, multi-city, and church (Galilee Lutheran) effort today serves 260 gardeners, 70% of them immigrants and many from Nepal and Myanmar. The gardeners speak a dozen first languages in their homes!

These gardeners are not only gardening to provide food for their families (and extended family and neighbors) but are eating healthy and familiar food. They are, at the same time, building a new community — something not



as easily done when one is an immigrant to a new country and a new way of life.

As someone who has visited the gardens and watched them grow, it is always a treat to see people tending the earth in new ways. I have seen many, many plants that were totally unfamiliar to me. I have been offered produce from people with a smile rather than spoken language. I've watched gardeners share tools, help with keeping the water tanks filled, and share produce and meals with each other.

The 2.5 acres of the Rice Street Gardens (1958 Rice Street, Maplewood) are part of a 13-acre parcel owned by the Saint Paul Regional Water Services. The owners would like to sell the entire piece. Rice Street Gardens are trying to raise \$1 million dollars to buy the land to preserve the gardens forever. More than a third of the

money has been raised but the need is great. Gifts of any size are welcome and appreciated and will be matched up to \$50,000. Gifts are tax deductible. You can help by sending a check to: Rice Street Gardens – Preservation Fund, Galilee Lutheran Church, 145 McCarrons Blvd. Roseville, MN 55113.

Hunger Grant Applications

The application process for ELCA Domestic Hunger Grants opens today! A new two-step process is designed to increase efficiency, shorten the time for award decisions, reduce barriers to the application process and allow for deeper engagement with partners invited to submit a full proposal. Prior to submitting a full grant proposal, grant applicants are



asked to complete a letter of inquiry by May 31 with a brief description of the project proposal. ELCA Domestic Hunger Grants are awarded to to ELCA congregations, organizations or other nonprofits with significant connections to ELCA congregations. <u>Learn more.</u>

New ELCA Young Adult Vocational Fellowship

The ELCA has launched a Young Adult Vocational Fellowship, which offers young adults an opportunity to discover their calling while gaining valuable professional experience. In partnership with new and existing year-long opportunities at ELCA affiliated ministries, participants are equipped with tools and knowledge to explore their faith and vocational aspirations while receiving support from a network of peers and experienced ELCA coaches. The program is designed to prepare communities and ministry organizations to welcome new, young and diverse leaders, paving the way for a more inclusive and dynamic future.



Fellows receive competitive compensation and benefits, including access to mental health resources, relocation assistance, coaching, and a small group cohort. The program has partnered with several sites for the 2023-2024 year, including The Dwelling, All Places Together, National Lutheran Communities & Services, Together Lab, Rainbow Trail Lutheran Camp, The Hunger Advocacy Fellow Program, Building Resilient Communities with the ELCA Churchwide Organization, Pine Ridge Reconciliation Center, the Minneapolis Area Synod, and Capital University. The ELCA Advocacy Team and the ELCA Young Adult Ministries teams are partnering to host two young adult-focused Farm Bill Listening Sessions. Future of Rostered Ministry

In March 2022, a diverse group was appointed to examine and improve the candidacy process that equips rostered ministers for service in the ELCA. This team is the <u>Candidacy Leadership Development Working Group</u>. In the last year it has spent time hosting virtual and in-person listening sessions to learn the needs of our church and surveying those excluded by the current candidacy process. The working group is now prioritizing feedback from the church at large. All members of the ELCA are invited to hearings at which the working group will share its findings. The Leadership Center for Social Justice at United Theological Seminary of the Twin Cities is inviting congregational pastors and ministers to apply for the second year of its program by July 1, 2023. The program, led by a team of experts, helps pastors develop and/or deepen sustainable, community-based, social justice ministries responsive to what God is doing in our world, congregations, and communities.



The cohort will meet twice monthly (Friday mornings) in a hybrid format from September 2023 through May 2024. Those who complete the program earn a Certificate in Leadership for Social Justice and may be eligible to earn up to eight credits toward a Doctor of Ministry degree.
