Good Shepherd Lutheran Church in Inver Grove Heights started a "Meet an Older Friend" event about eight years ago. The goal has always been to help connect young Confirmation students with older members of the congregation—to hear their wisdom, learn about their faith journeys together and share stories. This program was paused during COVID, and we brought it back for the first time this year. Five older adults from Good Shepherd were invited to share an hour of their time with 25 of our Confirmation students.

We know that cross-generational relationships are so important to the faith formation of young people. Through the "Meet an Older Friend" event, we also want our older adults to have an opportunity to share their wisdom and stories. We want our older adults to be recognized and honored for their faithfulness and life experience. And we want our students to hear affirmation and love from the adults. Both students and adults

have so much to offer and receive from one another.

The synod's Advocates for Racial Equity work group invites you to a discussion with author Shari Seifert about her book, *Ashes to Action: Finding Myself at the Intersection of the Minneapolis Uprising.* After the world witnessed the murder of George Floyd in Minneapolis, a passionate uprising erupted, with the intersection of 38th and Chicago at its epicenter. One block away stood Calvary Lutheran Church, an ELCA congregation whose members had engaged in racial justice work for years.

ASHES TO ACTION

In Ashes to Action, Shari provides her first-person account of the events following May 25, 2020. She joined others in the Calvary community to

show up, listen, and ask what was needed in the moment. As the lines between her congregation and neighborhood blurred, the way toward a faithful response became clearer. 

2024 Fretheim Lecture in Biblical Theology Tuesday, Jan. 9 | Luther Seminary, St. Paul

Renowned biblical scholar Amy-Jill Levine will deliver the 2024 Fretheim Lecture in Biblical Theology. She is the Rabbi Stanley M. Kessler Distinguished Professor of New Testament and Jewish Studies at Hartford International University for Religion and Peace as well as the University Professor of New Testament and Jewish Studies Emerita and the Mary Jane Werthan Professor of Jewish Studies Emerita at Vanderbilt University. The annual public lecture honors the legacy of the late Professor Terry Fretheim in making biblical-theological scholarship available to Luther Seminary students and surrounding communities.



At 3:30 p.m., Professor Levine will offer a free workshop for area clergy and seminary students that discusses why anti-Jewish preaching and teaching continue, details the popular misconceptions about the Jewish context of Jesus and Paul found in sermons and church-based curricula, and offers alternatives for reading the texts on which they are based. During the public lecture at 7 p.m., Professor Levine will present "The Parable of the Pharisee and the Tax Collector: Why Knowledge of Jewish History Matters for Christian Preaching and Teaching." Both events are free; no registration is required. The lecture will be <u>livestreamed</u> for those unable to attend in person. <u>Learn more.</u>
