Conference Assemblies

Tool Kit is held in conjunction with conference assemblies, when the synod's six conferences meet separately for pre-synod assembly business which may include elections, proposed resolutions or other matters. This year, the elections include a dean in North and South conferences; a member of Synod Council from East Central Conference; members for the Nominating Committee in East Central and City conferences; and the election of one lay person and one rostered minister (pastor or deacon) from all six conferences to be a voting member at the next ELCA Churchwide Assembly (CWA). The 2025 CWA will be held in Phoenix July 28–Aug. 2. Additional elections will occur at the Synod Assembly on May 11 at St. Andrew's Lutheran Church in Mahtomedi. More details for the elections will be shared in early March.

Check the voter allocation chart for the number of lay voters your congregation is allowed at conference assemblies. Besides caucusing, the conference gathering is a great way for both lay and rostered leaders to learn more about what is going on around the synod. Lay leaders who are not voting members for their congregation are welcome to participate but may not vote. There is no charge for those attending only a conference assembly.

For everything there is a season. Sometimes the most difficult step in moving into a new time is knowing when and what to let go. It takes courage to set a ministry or a program aside, even for a time, so that there might be room for something new to bloom.



Join us for a day of listening for where God is making room in your context, practice letting go, get comfortable with failure, and reconnect with the Spirit's gift of experimenting in the Body of Christ. Worship, share some great food (including communion), and build relationships with other congregations wrestling with the same questions you are.



Author Keaton Douglas joins host George A. Wood for a discussion of Keaton's latest book, *The Road to Hope: Responding to the Crisis of Addiction*. Substance use disorder claims more than 175,000 lives every year in the U.S., making it the third leading cause of death in this country. During the COVID–19 pandemic and since,



the crisis has accelerated dramatically. Addiction isn't just a physical and psychological illness; it's also a spiritual disease that requires a spiritual remedy. *The Road to Hope* addresses the deep need in our Church to respond to the addiction crisis. Author Keaton Douglas draws on her years of ministry in this field to educate and equip the body of Christ — clergy and laity alike — to understand and minister to our suffering brothers and sisters. Engle Professor of Preaching Emerita at Union Theological Seminary in New York City. An ELCA pastor, she is the author of two books: *Transforming the*



Stone: Preaching Through Resistance to Change (2001) and Marking Time: Preaching Biblical Stories in Present Tense (2007), which grew out of the Beecher Lectures she delivered at Yale Divinity School. Register whether you plan to attend in person or via Zoom.
