### A Message from Pastor Aaron:

Siblings in Christ,

As 2025 nears its end, one can begin to reflect on all that has happened here at Salem. While some of these events may feel like a lifetime ago, we shared in some incredible moments of meaningful worship and ministry together!



All the way back in January when we held our annual meeting, we discerned a path forward through votes and discussion and even now we can see and celebrate the fruits of this work.

In Lent we held meaningful worship with church members bringing Scripture to life through dramatizations of Biblical characters. Just last Sunday an adult forum topic about Biblical women was suggested, citing this Lenten theme. That alone shows me, this series continues to bear fruits as folks have seen themselves in God's story of salvation and want to learn more.

Our Easter Sunday was full of prayer and praise, with several beautiful moments of communal worship and the proclamation of our Risen Christ. I don't know about you but to hear the resounding "He has Risen Indeed" from a full sanctuary filled my heart with joy. Now as I look forward, I find myself eagerly awaiting our time together at All Saints' and Christmas Eve. Unique holidays that explore the fullness of God's story in and through our lives.

But while most churches slow down for the summer, this year we kept on running! Just a few weeks after Easter we had a large Solar System project installed on our building, fulfilling a multiyear stewardship vision and goal. Not only did the congregation do our due diligence in their prayer and research for this project, but we also came together to support and celebrate its completion. But really, this is only the beginning of our wonderful project, in that the power produced through this system, reduces future carbon emissions, and helps us with our utilities for years to come.

I look forward to being able to report on these results in the future, but after the switch was turned on midday August 4th, in August alone Salem produced 5.25 MWh of energy. From a glance at our bill from August we used 3.037 MWh, so we should be seeing some nice reductions in our electric bills once Xcel gets our net metering up and running.

While that was all happening above our heads, on the ground we continued to gather as a community and with our community, through events like Beer and Hymns, Night to Unite, the WSP Days Parade and Pride. We gathered for Bible studies, forums, meals, discussions, planning sessions, and fun. Each of these moments helped reach a larger group of neighbors with the Gospel.

Personally, in my role as your pastor, I was able to finish my "Second Act Cohort" experience through the synod, go to ELCA Churchwide Assembly as a voting member, and travel to Tanzania as a part of our Magome-Salem partnership. One of these experiences would have been enough for a year of joyful reflection, so to have all three was a blessing. I have a lot of hope in the work of the church near and far (especially our unique grace-filled Lutheran expression!).

Now I will admit, 2025 as a whole has been a tough year for many, in our community and around the world. Which is all the more reason to celebrate the glimpses of the Gospel we have been privileged to experience and share together. God's grace truly abounds, and we cannot lose sight of this all-powerful love that reaches out to us in spite of our collective sin. God's will of salvation made real in Christ, is continually renewing us in this work and Salem has put in a lot of work this year.







And this year is far from over. We still have several things planned in worship and outreach that can give glory to God and help us love our neighbors. I encourage you all to look through the upcoming events outlined in this newsletter and through the church calendar so you can put them on your own and help us grow in faith and fellowship together.

### From the Parish Nurse:









**September was Healthy-Aging Month**, celebrating the positive aspects of aging and exploring ways to enhance the wellbeing of older individuals. Healthy aging encompasses maintaining and improving physical, mental, spiritual, financial and social health.

The population of older adults in the U.S. is steadily increasing, and people are living longer than ever before. Our minds and bodies undergo countless changes as we age, but embracing a healthy lifestyle can help us navigate through these transformations with grace and vigor. Not only does it have the power to ward off potential health issues, but it also allows us to get every drop of joy and fulfillment from our lives. It is possible to live a vibrant and full life at any age.

What does healthy-aging look like? Healthy aging is the continuous process of making lifestyle adaptations to keep you healthy and comfortable throughout your life. Some ways to optimize your well-being as you age may include:

**Prioritize a balanced diet -** Choose foods high in vitamins, minerals and fiber, and drink an adequate amount of water to stay hydrated.

**Move your body regularly** - Finding movement and exercise you enjoy can help prevent chronic illnesses, enhance balance and endurance and decrease the likelihood of falls.

**Prevent financial exploitation** – Financial exploitation is one of six types of elder abuse impacting approximately 1 in 15 older adults and their families. Taking steps to protect your identity and assets before your risk factors increase, this will help prevent you from being exploited by family members or scams targeting seniors.

**Nurture relationships** - Cultivating social connections can bolster independence and overall wellbeing. Social isolation is a huge issue for older adults and increases the risk of depression.

Plan for inheritance and property transfer issues - All families have belongings that hold sentimental and emotional importance but little monetary value. These possessions are often not included in a person's will, which leaves the surviving family responsible for making difficult decisions about "who gets what" after their relative has passed. Making an inheritance and property transfer plan gives you peace of mind and reduces uncertainty for your loved ones. In addition, downsizing can help alleviate some of this responsibility and make life easier for your loved ones.

**Create a healthcare directive** - Advance care planning helps you and your loved ones prepare for future decisions about your medical care in the event you become seriously ill or unable to communicate your wishes.

# Salem's 2025 Visit to Our Sister Congregation in Magome, Tanzania

2025 marked Salem's ninth visit to our sister congregation in Magome, Tanzania. A group of six from Salem began the journey, departing MSP airport around 4 PM on September 20th. After a flight delay, we just made our connection in Amsterdam, arriving at Dar Es Salaam at 10:15 PM on September 21. Nine out of our eleven bags made it with us. Saja and Goodluck were waiting at the airport with a bus to take us to Wista, a lodging facility where we stayed the night. It was amazing to see the chaotic traffic—motorcycles, three-wheelers, buses, trucks, and people all trying to get somewhere. Despite driving on the left side of the road, it all somehow worked.

### Journey to Magome

After a long 12-hour bus ride to Iringa along a narrow mountain road through grassland and hills, we were welcomed by Bega Kwa Bega program coordinator Kirsten. We spent the night at the Lutheran Center and enjoyed a hearty breakfast the next morning. Before heading out, we met our interpreter, Ambrose, who is also a pastor in the Iringa district. Jack and Judy went shopping for village supplies while the rest of us explored the neighborhood. In the afternoon, our land cruisers and drivers—Hussein and [name blurred]—brought us to Magome.

### **Arrival in Magome**

After several hours on gravel roads, we were greeted about a mile outside the village by 30 or so people on motorcycles. As we exited our vehicles, there were hugs, tears, and joyful dancing. We handed out hats and reboarded the vehicles for the final leg to the church. Upon arrival, Pastor Capher Chavala welcomed us, and we joined others inside for introductions and song. We were shown to our rooms and later enjoyed a meal in the common area. The guest facility had electricity and a new bathroom. We also toured the pastor's office and the new church building. That night, we shared a meal, sang together, and rested.

### **Sunday Service & Visits**

After a 7 AM breakfast, we attended church where Pastor Aaron preached and led the service. It was a special day—Jack and Judy celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary. After the service and a quick lunch, we visited the village dispensary and were thrilled to learn they now have a doctor on-site. We delivered many



gifts, which benefit not only the sister congregation but the entire community. Recent improvements include new toilets and a maternity ward—approximately 36 births occur here each year. Later, we visited the Salem Preaching Points, handed out gifts, and Pastor Aaron led songs.

### **Schools & Youth Programs**

Monday began with a visit to the primary school, where we met the headmaster, Stephane, who oversees six teachers and 275 students. We were impressed to hear students recite numbers and speak in English. Next, we visited Lutangilo Secondary School, one of the top three schools in the region. It serves 239 students, including 17 Salem-sponsored students. We enjoyed performances by the students and shared a special lunch with those we sponsor. Gift bags were distributed before students returned to class. We also toured the school with second master, Albert Chavalo. That afternoon, we briefly toured the village water project. Thanks to a new 10,000-liter tank fed by a ground spring, the village now has 32 water points, significantly improving health and hygiene. After dinner, we gathered again for songs.

### Agriculture, RDO, and More

On Tuesday, we visited the avocado farm—trees are two to three years away from producing a crop. Then we returned to the village, packed, and traveled back to Iringa. Along the way, we stopped at the RDO (Rural Development Organization) and met with Principal



Ndokole and Staci, the coordinator. They serve 252 students through vocational training, water programs, and orphan support. We sponsor three students in tailoring, cooking, and electrical.

### The Diocese and Media Outreach

On Wednesday, we toured the Iringa Diocese headquarters. The Diocese supports 129 parishes and 900 workers, with 83 parishes currently partnered with the St. Paul Area Synod. We also learned about the "Million Tree" project to improve the environment and saw the newly translated HEHE Bible—HEHE being one of the native languages. The Diocese offers youth programs for those ages 13–45, including reproductive education and life skills training. That afternoon, we visited the Diocese's radio station, Radio Furaha, which broadcasts a 50/50 mix of parish and civil programming. We also toured a facility where people with disabilities learn trades and operate a small market to sell their goods.

### **Health and Wildlife**

Thursday, we toured the Ilula Hospital. Tanzanian hospitals have six levels of care, and Ilula is a mid-level facility serving people from up to 100 kilometers away. On Friday, we traveled to Mwagusi Safari at Ruaha National Park. We enjoyed three game drives over two days and saw a wide range of animals. We ended the day with a fine dinner in a dry riverbed.

### **Final Days**

Sunday morning, we returned to Iringa and stayed again at the Lutheran Center. On Monday, we headed to the airport but faced a six-hour delay. We received a lunch during the wait and later, upon arrival at Dar Es Salaam, enjoyed our final meal at a restaurant recommended by our guide, Goodluck. Though tired, we were excited to begin our final journey home—grateful for the memories,

friendships, and meaningful work shared during our time in Tanzania.

# FREE THANKSGIVING MEALS FROM CASPERS OF EAGAN


